



# News from Hunter

I recently addressed the one-time buzz word "spirituality" in a sermon. I recall that 20-30 years ago it was common to read or hear about spirituality from many sectors. Not only theologians, pastors, or other "professional Christians" would mention the concept either. One common stance that was made by folks is "I'm not religious, but I am spiritual."

In the church at the time there seemed to be a movement to either clarify, teach, reclaim, or even create spirituality. A person described as 'religious' was not really a compliment. Religion seemed to be denigrated to nearly a four letter word. But a truly 'spiritual' one was to be revered and admired.

I think we have gotten over that, and hope that religion shaming has become a practice of the past. As a Christian myself, I didn't really feel like I lacked any sense of spirituality, or that churches I was acquainted with were wanting in that regard either. After all, people invest their time and money in churches because of their spirit-

uality. Indeed, their religiosity need not be separated from any realization that church people are also spiritual people.

In her book Soul Feast, published during that era, Marjorie J. Thompson says "It involves conscious awareness of, and assent to, the work of the Spirit in us. Spirituality points to a path-to choices of belief, value commitments, patterns of life, and practices of faith that allow Christ to be formed in us." All of what she described is available through religious practice, worship participation, prayer, helping with church ministry, even involvement in committee work. I dare say any and all of these can be and are spiritual.

What is it that feeds your soul? How is that shaped by your involvement with your sisters and brothers of Hunter? What do you yearn for in days and years ahead as you journey with this congregation? These are questions worthy of your reflection. For Spiritual growth, nurture, and formation are a continuing process. As we celebrate the spiritual reality we have, may the Spirit of the Living God fall afresh upon us as well.



# Unity Garden Update

Everything seems to just be a journey. In the Bible, Exodus 35, explains how the people of Israel during their journey through the wilderness stop and create the tabernacle according to God's instructions. The people of Israel gave both their time and their things to be utilized during this construction phase based on each person's abilities. Similarly, the creation of the Unity Garden has been due to men, women, and children's hearts being moved to help out and in many different types of offerings made based on each person's abilities.



There will be much cardboard needed for the upcoming spring planting of the native plants since it is utilized for weed suppression under the mulch. Just like when needs to prep homegrown green beans for the cooking or canning process the prepping cardboard is needed before the spring planting. We, as a group, have already created two piles of delabeled and detaped cardboard that are 5 feet tall piles. However, this is just barely enough cardboard to go around the garden beds. We need to double or triple this amount of delabeled and detaped cardboard before spring. Therefore, on any odd numbered Sundays in February and March I plan on bringing out the cardboard to the Fellowship Hall for anyone during coffee time that wants to help out with doing this much-needed and extremely important prep work. The odd numbered Sundays are February 9th and 23rd and March 1st, 15th, and 29th. Feel free to continue donating cardboard as well.


