

Each subsequent Sunday, we'll hang a few leaves on the "tree" to represent areas of brokenness in the world and other prayer concerns. Transylvania Presbytery-Wide Mission Project During Lent


Mid-KY Presbytery is coordinating local Presbyteries to collect items for Disaster kits! We have been invited to participate.

When a tornado, flood, or hurricane devastates a community, people scramble to deal with the chaos and to recover. They need practical help – fast.

We can make a difference by contributing items for hygiene kits. We started packing hygiene kits in 2016. When we reach our 2020 goal of 2,000 hygiene kits, we'll celebrate an impressive milestone - 10,000 hygiene kits!

Each hygiene kit in a one-gallon zip lock bag includes:

- · 1 hand towel
- · 1 washcloth
- · 1 wide tooth comb
- · 1 nail clipper
- · 1 bar of soap (unscented, bath size in wrapper)
- · 1 toothbrush (in original package) (Toothpaste is not requested.)
- · 10 Band-Aids



Between now and Palm Sunday, April 5th, we at Hunter will collect the above items (barrel in kitchen hallway) and Outreach committee members will deliver them to Beaumont Presbyterian Church in Lexington.

Lola and Cecil Woolums: A World of Friends

Lola's great, great grandfather and his 2 brothers came from Doolin Ireland (Doolin is her maiden name). Doolin is a coastal village in County Clare, Ireland, on the Atlantic coast. It is a noted center of traditional Irish music. The Doonagore Castle is in the area. The three brothers left Ireland during the great famine and came to the United States. The Great Famine (Irish Potato Famine), was caused by a potato blight. The blight was exacerbated by the Whig government's economic policy of laissez-faire capitalism; absentee landlordism and single-crop dependence. During the famine, about one million people died and a million more emigrated from Ireland.



Cecil and Lola Woolums' parents were sharecroppers. Lola started school in a one room school house in Morgan County. Cecil and Lola met as freshman in Versailles high school but went their separate ways. Cecil joined the Army and three years later Lola went with a friend to the 1957 New Year's Eve Party at Fort Knox and met Cecil again. They were married the next year at Epworth United Methodist by Rev. Russel Patton. (Personal note: Cathy Martin was confirmed by Rev. Patton; what a wonderful man of God.)

Cecil joined the Army as a private. He advanced to the rank of Sergeant First Class. Then he attended Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning Georgia. After serving in the Army for 25 years, he retired as a Major. They have traveled the country and world together. They had 3 tours in Germany, 3 tours in Japan, 2 tours in Vietnam. Cecil worked for nine years in Saudia Arabia. He had duty stations in Virginia (twice) and Texas and California (twice). Their first duty station as a couple was Fort Knox and their son was born January 1960 at Ireland Army Hospital (named in honor of Major General Merritte Ireland, a surgeon and U.S. Army Surgeon General from October 30, 1918, to May 31, 1931). Their daughter was born in Frankfurt Germany in 1965. Cecil retired in 1978 at Fort Hood, Texas. Wherever they went they made lifelong friends. Military families are exceptionally close to each other. Visitors come to their home from all over the world and country and Lola is called "Mama Lola" by her Saudia Arab friends.



After retirement the family moved to Augusta Georgia to stay in a moderate climate and on recommendation of a family friend. In Augusta they had several connections to the Augusta National Golf Club. Their daughter worked with concessions during one Masters tournament and Cecil delivered 50 cases of strawberries to the Clubhouse. At that time Lola, was Committee Chairman of the Lady Masons big fundraiser that was selling a huge refrigerator truck full of Florida strawberries.

Later an old commander contacted Cecil and recommended that he accept a job as an advisor to the Arabian National guard. And Cecil fol-

lowed the call. While there, Lola and Cecil engaged in various aspects of the culture including drinking camel milk.

Eventually Cecil and Lola came to Kentucky to be closer to their children. Their daughter recommended they look at Hunter. Once they joined they became fast friends with Joy and Morris Swofford and Rue and Beryl Wallace. Beryl and Lola grew up in Morgan County, KY and this helped make an immediate bond.

Special notes: Their son was a volunteer fireman in several of the stations where the family lived. Lola stresses our need to support our first responders. Cecil and their daughter went on the Kentucky Honor Flight Sept 21, 2019. "Honor Flight Bluegrass honors our heroes, recognizes their sacrifices, and takes extreme pride with our unwavering gratitude and utmost respect to provide this service to World War II, Korean, and Vietnam veterans who served during that time."


