



## Singing and Prayer

This week, rather than what have been the customary note cards, I am sending a daily devotional guide. I am still suggesting a scripture reading for each day, but this week I have included the first stanza from a hymn in our <u>Glory to God</u> hymnal, instead of a "prayer." I added the quotation marks as Hymns, after all, are sung prayers. My hope is that the lyrics will resonate with you in some way, and encourage, challenge, or comfort you in your faith.

This week there will also be no keywords or phrases, as have been found on prayer cards sent in previous weeks. While that may be a nice idea, and has been appreciated by some, it could possibly also serve as a stumbling block. Rather than offer a word to guide your reading, praying, and singing in a certain direction, I recognize that the Spirit will guide you in a way that you need to be guided. That is ultimately more important than a word of phrase suggestion I might offer.

This coming Sunday, May 31 will be Pentecost, the celebration of God's Spirit in our midst. Of all times, this day is not about what one voice says, but that we are many voices, and God speaks within

us! So allow the Spirit to speak to and through you this coming week of Pentecost.

If you have access to a computing device and want to sing or hum along with these hymns, I highly recommend a resource you can find: <a href="https://hymnary.org">hymnary.org</a> This database is run by a non-profit group to help Music Ministers and Directors, Pastors, others involved in planning worship, and even you, the church. I use this website each week as I choose hymns for Hunter worship services. I hope you enjoy it as much as I have.

#### Weekly devotional suggestions:

- Day 1: Read Psalm 150, "Praise the Lord! God's glories show, Alleluia! saints within God's courts below, Alleluia! angels round the throne above, Alleluia! all who see and share God's love. Alleluia!" Hymn "Praise the Lord! God's Glories Show" by Henry Francis Lyte, tune LLANFAIR by Robert Williams.
- Day 2: Read Psalm 141, "I call, O Lord, on you: come quickly to my aid; hear from your throne in heaven above my cry of deep distress." Hymn "I Call, O Lord, on You" by James Quinn, SJ, tune ST. BRIDE by Samuel Howard.
- Day 3: Read Lamentations 3:22-33, "Great is thy faithfulness, O God my Father; there is no shadow of turning with thee. Thou changest not; thy compassions they fail not. As thou hast been thou forever wilt be. Great is thy faithfulness! Great is thy faithfulness! Morning by morning, new mercies I see. All I have needed thy hand hath provided. Great is thy faithfulness, Lord unto me!" Hymn "Great Is Thy Faithfulness" by Thomas O. Chisholm, tune FAITHFULNESS by William Marion Runyan.
- Day 4: Read Philippians 1:1-11, "Give thanks, O Christian people, for workers of our day who heed the call to service and make it their life's way to go to feed the hungry, to tend to those in need, to work for equal justice, till all God's folk are freed." Hymn "Give Thanks, O Christian People" by Mary Jackson Cathey, tune ES FLOG EIN KLEINS WALDVÖGELEIN by Memmingen ms. (17th century German folk tune "A little forest bird flew").
- Day 5: Read Acts 2:42-47, "Called as partners in Christ's service, called to ministries of grace, we respond with deep commitment fresh new lines of faith to trace. May we learn the art of sharing, side by side and friend with friend, equal partners in our caring to fulfill God's chosen end." Hymn "Called as Partners in Christ's Service" by Jane Parker Huber, tune BEECHER by John Zundel.
- Day 6: Read Psalm 98, "Earth and all stars! Loud rushing planets! Sing to the Lord a new song! Hail, wind, and rain! Loud blowing snowstorm! Sing to the Lord a new song! God has done marvelous things. We too sing praises with a new song!" Hymn "Earth and All Stars!" by Herbert Frederick Brokering, tune EARTH AND ALL STARS by David N. Johnson.
- Day 7: Read Romans 12:1-8, "Sacred the body God has created, temple of Spirit that dwells deep inside. Cherish each person; nurture relation. Treat flesh as holy, that love may abide." Hymn "Sacred the Body" by Ruth Duck, tune TENDERNESS by Colin Gibson.

### **PNC Update**

When last month's newsletter was in production, your Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) was temporarily daunted by the arrival of the pandemic and the need to move to online meetings and interviews. However, we are now back on the job you elected us to do, and making good progress. After all of us had examined and evaluated nearly 150 multi-page Personal Information Forms (PIFs), we have held initial Zoom interviews with several promising candidates. Soon we will schedule a second round of interviews with those candidates who have turleadership doesn't happen



very frequently in the life of a congregation, here is a review of the steps yet to come:

- 1. The PNC selects a nominee and extends a call to this person.
- 2. The PNC and the candidate negotiate the terms of the call.
- 3. The Pastoral Transitions Commission of the Presbytery (the nine-member board which has oversight over all times of transition in pastoral leadership for congregations of the Presbytery) approves the terms of the call.
- 4. The PNC reports the call to Session. Session authorizes a Congregational Meeting to elect the new Pastor, and notifies the Interim that his employment will terminate in accord with the terms of his contract.
- 5. Information about the nominee is circulated to members ahead of the Congregational meeting.
- 6. At the Congregational Meeting, the PNC presents the nomination and the terms of call, and the congregation votes to elect the pastor presented. The three parties to the call (Pastor, PNC, and Committee on Ministry) sign the call.
- 7. A service of worship celebrating the installation (and ordination if it is the person's first ordained call) of the new pastor is organized by the Presbytery.

As we get closer and closer to finding the best possible person to be our next called Pastor, we pause to express appreciation to our Interim Pastor, J. T. Silence, for his encouragement of our work and especially for his pastoral care. He has endeared himself to all of us as he has helped us examine our history as a congregation and begin to imagine where we might yet go under new leadership.

We thank you for your patience and support. At this point there are two things we still need from members of the Hunter family. The first is your respect of PNC confidentiality: please do not ask any of us for details until we can with integrity share them with the whole congregation. The second is your continuing prayers for wisdom and discernment—for us and for the candidates we interview.









## Glendover School Backpacks Update
