all-powerful and ever-present.


We know you are a good God who holds us in our anxiety and distress and who has a plan for our future.


On December 24, our 6p.m. Christmas Eve service will be pre-recorded and posted on Facebook.

Please indicate on your check or order form if you will pick up your plant, want home delivery or want to donate it to a local hospital.




Unity Garden Update
