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Pastor Nominating Committee




The Alternatives Class

We will discuss the book, "Fear of the Other: No Fear in Love," by William H. Willimon.


As $\underline{\text{always}}$ you are, of course, welcome to read the book, but excerpts are read aloud by Carol Hulse.





One Great Hour of Sharing

Each year during Lent, Presbyterians have joined with Christians throughout the nation in responding to Christ's love for all people by joyfully sharing that love with people in need through supporting One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS). The One Great Hour of Sharing ministries are:



- **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance** responds locally to help with a wide variety of disasters. Recovery efforts from local wildfires, tornados, and floods receive needed funding and refugees are offered help to seek legal advice about becoming legal residences in the United States.
- The Presbyterian Hunger Program provides funding for grants to Blessings in a Backpack; donating money, food and volunteers at Food banks; and raising funding through the CROP Walk.
- The Presbyterian Committee on Self-Development of People works with low income communities across the United States to overcome oppression and injustice. Projects include literacy, worker-owned cooperatives, advocacy, youth-led initiatives, farming, immigration/refugees issues and capacity building.

We ask you to prayerfully consider what you can do to answer God's call and contribute to these vital missions.

B.U.I.L.D. Update

The Issues B.U.I.L.D. will be addressing on Tuesday, May 3rd are:

- 1) Mental Healthcare the research team has discovered that many people with mental illness with financial challenges struggle to make it to their appointments or to go get their medication. The research team is still working on the best way to increase the transportation possibilities of getting these people to their appointments or to go and get their medication.
- 2) Lowering the homicides B.U.I.L.D. will be asking for the Group Violence Intervention (GVI) strategy to be implemented in Lexington since it is still the best possible focused deterrence strategy which allows community leaders, law enforcement, and social service providers to intervene in the lives of at-risk individuals *before* they escalate to shooting and offers the support they need to change their lifestyle. When implemented correctly this fully lowers the homicides significantly. - 3) Dedicated funding for Affordable Housing B.U.I.L.D. thought they had a dedicated revenue source of funding for Affordable housing in 2014. However, since then, we have learned it is still not a "dedicated" funding source. 2,922 families have been housed using the Affordable Housing fund since 2014. There is still a huge need for more affordable housing in Lexington since rents are going up drastically. Last year B.U.I.L.D. won an investment of \$10 million from the American Rescue Plan as a one-time win. This year the hope is to win \$10 million in dedicated Affordable housing funding since the need is very great and many other cities are already doing this.

The Nehemiah Action Assembly which will address these three issues will be on Tuesday, May 3rd with the doors opening at the Central Bank Center, 430 W. Vine St at 6:15 pm with the program starting at 7 pm. (Free parking is available in the Rupp Arena lot off Manchester Street). This is a once a year event that is VERY important since I don't know a single person who would be okay with burying their child, their spouse, or their parent as the next homicide in Lexington. It is time to treat our neighbors as ourselves.



Unity Garden News

I have no problem feeding the squirrels the droppings from the "bird suet" feeder. However, if anyone spots a squirrel directly on the new bird suet feeder, please let Ann Freytag know so she can adjust the location or height of the feeder to help the squirrels be more legit. If I had to guess which weed might be the most prominent this year all over Lexington it will be the wild onion since it is popping up just about everywhere that I have been driving in March.

The benches should be coming out soon once I get the ORANGE string up to mark the walking path so that people hopefully will not walk on the native plants. The birdhouse should also be coming out in April so keep your eyes peeled for new things (including the natives peeking out from the ground) this year.

There are several work days this spring for anyone able to help out:

- 1) Saturday, April 2nd from 9 am to noon in the Unity Garden room inside the church to get cardboard organized, detaped, and ready.
- 2) Wednesday, April 13th from 7-8:30 pm in the Unity Garden room inside the church to start placing cardboard into the hallway that is fully ready to go onto the garden in May.
- 3) Saturday, April 30th from 9 am to noon to either work on cardboard or be outside working in the garden. This will depend on several factors so stay tuned.
- 4) Saturday, May 7th is of course Derby Day which also means it is World Labyrinth Day. World Labyrinth Day is a way to "Walk at one as one" which means for each time zone around the globe people walk labyrinths at 1 pm to be united with the world. Similar in many ways of everyone praying on the same day for the same reason.
- 5) Saturday, May 21st from 9-noon is a work day in the garden

Anyone with extra lawn bags to be donated to the Unity Garden will be much appreciated this year. These can go in the blue bin near the female bathroom at the front entrance to the church.

This should be an exciting and exhilarating Unity Gardening season!




